What's the Infrastructure Act **Bringing to Pennsylvania?**

Investments in roads, bridges, and airports, extended broadband internet access, expanded public transportation, and more.

Pennsylvania's infrastructure has been crumbling into disrepair for decades, but things are about to change thanks to these new investments. Over the next five years, these investments will get folks back to work on essential projects. The map to the right highlights some of these investments in Pennsylvania.

Expanding Broadband Internet Access in Every Corner of the State

Internet access is necessary to work, learn, get health care, and stay connected with loved ones. With this funding, we can expand internet access to nearly 400,000 residents and make 2.9 million low-income families eligible for benefits to help them pay for broadband.1

Ensuring Clean and Safe Drinking Water

Clean and safe drinking water should be a right guaranteed to everyone-but that's not a reality right now. For example, in rural Jefferson County, the water in some schools contained dangerous levels of lead, up to 25 times the state limit. This funding will allow us to eliminate lead pipes and ensure that every family in every neighborhood across Pennsylvania has access to clean water.²

Improving and Expanding Public Transportation

Millions of people rely on public transportation to get around, but these essential services have lacked investment for years. This bill will bring much-needed funding to various public transit agencies across the state. Amtrak is expanding some intercity routes, including plans to connect Scranton, Reading, and Allentown to New York City.⁵

Reclaiming Abandoned Mines

Pennsylvania has thousands of abandoned mines and orphaned oil wells, posing severe health risks and hindering economic development in 43 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties. The Infrastructure Act will employ people to plug wells and reclaim mining areas, eliminating health and environmental hazards across Pennsylvania—from Scranton to Shamokin to Smithdale.6

Fixing Our Dilapidated Bridges

Pennsylvania ranks second in the country for the total number of structurally deficient bridgesincluding 142 in Allegheny County alone.3

Repairing Highways Across Pennsylvania

Our state has more than 7,540 miles of highway in poor condition, and drivers pay more than \$600 a year making car repairs due to our bad roads. We can repair our roads to make them safer for everyone and ease congestion on crowded highways like Route 22 in the Lehigh Valley with this funding.4
